 - General Assembly of Fire Brigades 9.6.2018






Rescue service reform in Finland

- Connected with the simultaneous county-level government and healthcare and social welfare reforms
 - 18 new counties; the structure, services and financing of health and social services and the duties of regional government will all be reorganized.
 - The reform is due to come into force on 1 January 2019
- There will be 18 regional rescue departments (now 22) meaning each county will have their own rescue department
 - This allows rescue departments to continue to provide first response services for the counties
 - One regional rescue department for the capital area –the second biggest in the Nordic (after Stockholm); 10 communities and 1,7 million inhabitants







Internal Security Strategy

- "A Safe and Secure Life", is a road map for ensuring that Finland will be the safest country in the world
- Foresight highlights challenges in internal security
- 8 sets of measure:
 - analysis and foresight
 - powers and capability
 - everyday security
 - knowledge about security and crisis resilience
 - security innovations
 - steering of internal security
 - security work in counties and municipalities
 - monitoring





The Security Strategy for Society 2017

- Set of national principles regarding preparedness & guides the preparedness actions of administrative branches
- Two sections: a cooperation model for comprehensive security & preparedness guidelines for the administrative branches
